The AS exam will be in May 2016 and the A2 exams will be in June 2017.





Nature Vs Nurture

The nature versus nurture debate concentrates on the question of how far our ability is fixed at birth by our inborn nature. Nature refers to a person's genetic inheritance or inherited characteristics. Nurture refers to the way in which upbringing and environment influence our development as individuals.

Nature Vs Nurture

It is sometimes difficult to separate the two e.g. if the child of musically talented parents is also gifted musically, then is this down to genetic inheritance (nature) or because they grew up in a musical environment (nurture)?

Nature V Nurture

- Are little boys born inherently boisterous, instinctively wanting to play with cars?
- Are little girls inherently calm, instinctively wanting to play with dolls?

Nature V Nurture

Or does society create them, by guiding them towards these toys e.g. blue for boys and pink for girls, separate pages in magazines for 'boys' toys and 'girls' toys, separate clothes, even as very small babies. You could probably tell from just looking at the 'Congratulations' cards in a maternity hospital what sex each mother had given birth to!
