Dear Parents and carers

We have been made aware of a member of our school community in Year 9 who has tested positive for COVID 19 on Sunday 29 November.

This letter is to inform you of the current situation and provide advice on how to support your child. Please be reassured that for most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

Following my letter yesterday, I know that you may find this concerning but I wanted to reassure you that we are continuing to monitor the situation and are working closely with Public Health England.

The cases within Years 7, 9 and 12 reported this weekend are all treated as single cases as they have occurred within separate year group bubbles. There is no further action for the school other than to identify the close contacts of each student and ask them to self-isolate.

The small number of children who have been in close contact with the individual who has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) have been contacted today by a member of senior staff and will receive a letter informing them that their child must stay at home for 14 days.

I would like to thank all our community for the messages of support we have taken this weekend. As a result of our collective action to follow the rules, the school is able to remain open for the majority of our students due to the measures we have in place.

The school remains open and your child should continue to attend as normal if they remain well.

Public Health England have asked me to remind all parents of the following in addition to the national guidance that currently govern household contact.

What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID 19

If your child develops symptoms of COVID-19, they must not come to school and should remain at home for at least **10 days** from the date when their symptoms appeared. Anyone with symptoms will be eligible for testing and this can be arranged via <https://www.nhs.uk/ask-for-a-coronavirus-test> or by calling 119.

All other household members who remain well, must stay at home and not leave the house for 14 days. This includes anyone in your 'Support Bubble'.

The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill.

Household members should not go to work, school or public areas and exercise should be taken within the home.

If you require help with buying groceries, other shopping or picking up medication, or walking a dog, you should ask friends or family. Alternatively, you can order your shopping online and medication by phone or online.



Household members staying at home for 14 days will greatly reduce the overall amount of infection the household could pass on to others in the community.

If you are able, move any vulnerable individuals (such as the elderly and those with underlying health conditions) out of your home, to stay with friends or family for the duration of the home isolation period.

Symptoms

The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are recent onset of:

- a new continuous cough
- a high temperature
- a loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

How to stop COVID-19 spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting ill with COVID-19

Do

- wash your hands with soap and water often – do this for at least 20 seconds
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- wash your hands as soon as you get home
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze
- put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
