

Drugs Policy

Mission Statement

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1. Definition of a drug

A drug is a substance that affects the way in which the body functions physically, emotionally or mentally. For purposes of this policy, by 'drugs' we are referring to illegal substances and also, legal substances such as: alcohol, tobacco, volatile substances, over the counter or prescription medicines and new psychoactive substances. By Drugs Paraphernalia we mean items such as cannabis grinders, rolling papers, filters, matches, lighters and pipes etc...

2. Drugs on school premises

The legal definition of school premises includes everything within the property boundaries including buildings, outbuildings, playgrounds, fields and also extends to travelling to and from school, whilst wearing school uniform, and includes other settings such as vehicles or any venue managed by the school at the time e.g. premises of a school trip or visit.

Prescription and non-prescription medicines

Each school has a policy/procedure for the administration of medicines that must be followed for everyone's safety.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought on to school premises or consumed during the course of a school day. Any adult (or staff, pupils, parents, carers and visitors) under the effects of alcohol will be asked to leave the premises and return at a later date for the safety of the whole school. Parents will be asked to remove their children from the school and will be encouraged to seek immediate medical support if appropriate.

Smoking/vaping

School premises are a 'no smoking' site at all times. Pupils are not permitted to bring to school smoking materials, including matches and lighters. In the interests of health and safety, should a pupil be found in possession of any of these on school premises, they will be confiscated, a suitable sanction issued and parents informed.

Illegal drugs and 'psychoactive substances'

No illegal drugs, new psychoactive substances or drugs paraphernalia are allowed to be brought on to, or used, on school premises. Bringing any such items onto school premises is considered a serious breach of this drugs policy. Seeking to influence or glamorise illegal drug use or the use of psychoactive substances either in person on school premises or via social networking sites is also considered a serious breach of this drugs policy.

Solvents

The school will ensure that potentially hazardous substances it authorises are stored safely, and pupils will be supervised if it is necessary that they come into contact with them in the course of their work. Pupils are not permitted to be in possession of solvents. Bringing solvents or hazardous substances onto school premises is considered a serious breach of this drugs policy

3. Drugs education

We believe that knowledge is power and so we ensure that age appropriate education and support is provided through our curriculum. Drugs education is delivered through the Life Education, R.S.E. and Science curricula.

4. Responses to drug related incidents

A drug incident may be any of the following:

- Finding drugs, or related drug paraphernalia, on school premises
- · Possession of drugs by an individual on school premises
- Use of drugs by an individual on school premises
- Supply of drugs on school premises
- Individuals disclosing information about their drug use
- Rumours of parents, staff or pupils using drugs
- Reports of parents, staff or pupils using drugs
- Hiding drugs in or around the school premises for later collection (by themselves or
- by third parties)
- Glamorising or encouraging the use of drugs and other substances

The school is aware of its legal responsibilities regarding drug related incidents and in responding to incidents, seeks to work in line with local and national guidance.

A member of the senior leadership team will normally be responsible for co-ordinating the management of drug-related incidents, offering sources of support and liaising with outside agencies. Incidents will be dealt with after assessing the situation and will be reported to the Headteacher. All incidents and responses will be recorded within 24 hours.

Appropriate support will be offered to those with substance related problems. Talking with an individual about a drug related incident will have as its purpose to confirm or reject suspicions or allegations, rather than conduct a wider investigation.

If any pupil or adult on school premises is found in possession of an unauthorised drug it will be confiscated, if possible. If the drug is suspected to be illegal, the school will contact the police for discussion. Illegal substances will be legally destroyed or handed to the police as soon as possible and not stored long-term. Parents will normally be informed (for a pupil) and other professionals such as the LA, Youth Service, Police, GP, Social Services will be informed or consulted as appropriate.

A detailed record should be kept by the school.

Evidence of the use, possession, or supply (inc. intent to supply) of illegal drugs and psychoactive substances on the school premises (as defined in this policy) will almost certainly result in permanent exclusion. Permanent exclusion will be always be considered in accordance with DfE guidance on exclusions.

Where there is evidence of the use, possession or supply (inc. intent to supply) of non-illegal drugs, each case will be assessed individually, and levels of sanctions may vary according to the seriousness of the incident and the pupil's involvement, up to and including permanent exclusion.

In line with legislation, the school reserves the right to search pupils if they have reason to believe that they are carrying unauthorised substances. Searches will be conducted in line with the DfE publication 'Searching, screening and confiscation – Advice for Headteachers, school staff and governing bodies (January 2018)'. Searches will be carried out by two members of staff, one of whom must be a member the Senior Leadership Team.

5. Confidentiality

Complete confidentiality can never be promised to a pupil, though information given in confidence will not generally be disclosed to anyone else. In particular, if a pupil chooses to disclose that they are using a drug

without medical authorisation, this information will not be used against them. However, action will be taken to ensure the pupil comes to no serious harm if this is considered a risk. Regarding disclosures staff need to carefully define and communicate the boundaries of confidentiality offered.

6. Support for pupils

The welfare of pupils is paramount. Following actions to preserve safety, the health and emotional needs of pupils will be considered. Support is available through the pastoral system, to ensure a caring response to pupils in distress.

Interventions will be considered if the school feels a pupil is showing signs which indicate risks of, or from, involvement with drugs, whether their own or their parents'/carers'. Such interventions may include consultation with parents/carers and other agencies, possible case conferences and subsequent referral.

The school will work closely with its Community Police Officers. If pupils are involved with any activity which breaks the law the police may be involved in the confiscation of items, Restorative justice, group work and education as well as links with home. Parents/Carers will always be informed when the police are involved and given the opportunity to attend any interviews.
