Benjamin Archer is a trained professional actor who has worked on both stage and screen and is now also Lecturer in the Department of Art and Music at Solent University.

In this workshop, Benjamin focuses on the later work of Stanislavski's much misinterpreted 'system' as outlined in the original Russian publication *An Actor's Work on Oneself*. The workshop gives students the opportunity to practise techniques to discover how work in accordance with the text rather than on the text is an effective way of developing characterisation and scene work from the earliest stages of rehearsal. We will explore a scene from Anton Chekhov's Three Sisters.

In this Political Ideologies session on 5th October, Dr Maria Serban from the School of Politics, Philosophy, Language and Communication Studies at UEA will run an interactive talk for students on **The Many Critics of Liberalism**.

Maria will try to answer why we read so often today that liberalism is in crisis, failing or already dead. Maria notes that 'political societies based on liberal principles have been more successful, on almost any measure, than regimes that are more authoritarian, communitarian or sectarian.'

The session will develop thinking, skills and approaches to support students in their Politics studies and future aspirations.

Dr Thomas Karshan from the University of East Anglia argues that, before the twentieth century, the distinction between creative writing and literary criticism was not so clear as it seems to us.

In his workshop on 3rd October, students will learn about and practice games of imitation, parody, and re-writing, demonstrating how these historic methods have formed the literature we study, and how students can use them in their own creation and criticism.

Following the very positive responses to our previous Maths Headliner tutorials, we are really pleased to be able to offer our first Maths Headliner this term which looks at **Mathematical Problem Solving**.

The Headliner format includes a 20 minute video provided in advance to set the scene and expectations for the live tutorial which will take place with the excellent Dr Robert Whittaker on 28th September.

In the Headliner video, Robert considers what mathematical problem solving is before looking at some techniques that can be used. Robert then applies these techniques to some example problems before introducing the 'homework' problems. These will be discussed and collaboratively solved during the live session on 28th September.

This is the flagship University of Cambridge access programme for students thinking of applying for a STEM degree, and **provides 17 months of free problem solving supervisions** plus a residential in Cambridge for those who have been the most engaged with the programme. This is also **not solely aimed** at students thinking of Oxbridge, but is for any student thinking of applying to a competitive university (Queens', Edinburgh, Imperial, Warwick, Bath etc) for a STEM degree.
