

Unit 1: Changing Awareness of Crime

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Unit 1: Changing awareness of crime

- Controlled assessment unit
- Worth 25% of Diploma
- Explores the different types of crime, influences on perceptions of crime and why some crimes are unreported. It explores the role of the media in its portrayal of crime. This is assessed through controlled assessment and will be carried out in year 12.
- Controlled assessment will be completed in a computer room over 8 hours and will lead to the design of a campaign for change related to an underreported crime such as hate crime, honour crime, domestic violence, technological crime or white collar crime.

Unit 2: Theories of crime

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Unit 2: Changing awareness of crime

- This is an exam unit and is worth 25% of Diploma
- 1 hour 30 minute exam (sat at the end of year 13).
- Mixture of short answer and extended answer questions.
- This unit explores the different theories of crime. It explores biological, individualistic (psychological) and sociological theories to try and explain if criminals are born or made.
- It also explores how these theories have had an impact on policy development.

Unit 3: Crime scene to courtroom

- Controlled assessment unit.
- Worth 25% of Diploma.
- Sat in year 13.
- This unit provides an understanding of the criminal justice system from the moment a crime has been identified to the verdict.
- Personnel will be examined including forensic specialists, pathologists, the police and the Crown Prosecution Service.
- Physical and testimonial evidence will be explored to find out what can be collected at a crime scene and what makes it admissible in court.
- Learners will be examining cases for validity and investigating miscarriages of justice.

As such, you will be able to evaluate the effectiveness of the process of social control in delivering policy in different contexts.

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
